Class trip to Littlecote House...

"Owls Class enjoyed a fantastic local trip to Littlecote House this week as part of their learning about the Romans. The children were fascinated to learn that the Roman mosaic was created over 1,600 years ago during Roman Britain and was discovered centuries later after being hidden beneath the ground.

At the centre of the mosaic is Orpheus, a character from Greek mythology, playing his lyre. The mosaic is divided into four sections called quadrants, each showing different animals and patterns. Although some people think these may represent the four seasons, historians are not certain. The images are more likely to show harmony in nature, with music calming the animals.

During the visit, pupils read information signs around the grounds and completed a quiz to check their understanding. They showed excellent curiosity and focus throughout the trip and represented the school brilliantly." Mrs Mirza.

Reading Challenges for children in West Berkshire!

Nationally, The Reading Agency is running their Winter Mini Challenge again this year. Children can join the challenge online at wintermini.org.uk. They are encouraged to read 3 books and review them on the website anytime from now until the 20th February 2026. Those that leave their 3 reviews will earn a special badge, a certificate and

be entered into a prize draw to win a bundle of exciting children's books.

Our local libraries run their own year-round challenge across West

Berkshire – Library Star! They are keen to boost this over the winter break
to keep children reading whilst they are not at school. Children joining

Library Star will be able to choose one of five character bookmarks when



they sign up. They then collect a 'star' for their bookmark with every book returned to the library. They have certificates for any child who collects 10 stars and becomes a star reader! Being a library star is all about finding the joy of reading a good book. Children can read any books they like independently, or with someone else.

This winter, a charity called Small Acts of Kindness has sourced, packed and distributed over 10,000 'Warm in Winter' gift bags across Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire. Each bag includes things to keep people warm, like blankets, socks and hot drinks. The project aims to bring comfort to elderly and vulnerable people in the colder months. It shows that small acts of kindness can make a big difference in someone's life.

The Bible teaches that God gave Jesus to the world as a gift. The kindness God showed by sending Jesus was fully seen in how Jesus lived His life, making everyone feel welcome, helping others and teaching forgiveness. Another BIG thankyou to our amazing PTFA for our whole school trip to the pantomime this week! We all had a great time and loved the drama, song and giggles throughout the show!




